Fiscal Year July 1, 2011 - June 30, 2012



The goal of The South Side Newspaper Project remains to have even more South Side students from local schools involved, feature more stories by community members in The Stand and gain support from more local advertisers. These are our best ways to sustain the paper for years to come.



The project has been successful thanks to its unique partnership between Syracuse University's S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications and the local resident organization, the Southside Community Coalition. This collaboration allows The South Side Newspaper Project to share human interest stories and provide a real-world reporting opportunity for the university's journalism students.

This past year, we have continued to produce and publish eight print issues, involved more reporting stu-

dents and professors – now even working directly with a photography class – and welcomed more community correspondents to the staff.

At the start of 2012 we also welcomed an interim director, Newhouse graduate student Tara Donaldson, who took over to keep the project on track while I was out on maternity leave. Tara began with the project in July of 2011 as a staff reporter and next took on the role as director to assist staff reporters and community correspondents with story ideas. Her assistance during these couple months kept stories rolling into the paper and being posted online.

Also during this fiscal year, the project offered its first interactive Behind the Scenes workshop.

This event put a twist on the usual workshop offering and let the project provide a look at all that goes into getting out a print issue. The offering also allowed reporters and readers to meet face to face. SU reporting students explained how they developed their stories and the process taken to put together an article, and readers were able to ask questions, give feedback and share story ideas.

# Project Recognition

#### Chancellor's Citation for Excellence

Prof. Steve Davis, founder of The South Side Newspaper Project and Department Chair of the Newspaper and Online Journalism Program at the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications, was one of five Syracuse University faculty and staff to receive the Chancellor's Citation for Excellence Award in 2012. I really think The Stand is something special. In a world where larger news outlets are laying off reporters to save money and stay in business, it's become increasingly difficult for a newsroom to cover its market. Syracuse is especially hard to cover because of the broad range of issues residents face in each section of the city. However, that's also what makes it so fascinating.

This creates an opportunity for The Stand to be the strongest voice from the South Side. We can find the stories. We can open conversations. No one can better explain a community than its own residents.

The thing that makes me the proudest is that The Stand symbolizes a collaboration between Syracuse University and the South Side community. Students often enter Professor Steve Davis' classroom knowing nothing about the South Side. It can be intimidating to enter an unfamiliar neighborhood and try to relate to people. I know that it was difficult for me at first.

I come from suburban Colorado; I had no idea how to interview someone about difficult urban issues I had never experienced. How could I possibly
